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November 6-24, 2023 Thú Duc, Vietnam

Glimpse 4 – Putting Together Our Committees, Reports, and Special Guest – Thursday, November 9, 2023

On Tuesday, November 7, another part of important work for the General Chapter occurred: naming the General Chapter Council to assist in the chapter's work. First, we voted for the Presiding Council of the General Chapter. By right of his office, the General Superior is the president: Father Eugênio BARBOSA MARTINS (*Brazil*). The General Council presents three moderators in advance for the chapter to approve. We approved the proposed Father Philip Benzy ROMICIAN (*India*), Father Anaclet BAMBALA (*Republic of Congo*), and Father Justin CHAWKAN (*Sri Lanka*). After this procedure of the chapter, the next is to have the delegates choose two more to represent them and join the Council. After three ballots, the chapter elected Father Maurits Gijsbrechts, delegate from North Europe-Mozambique and yours truly. Each night, the Chapter Council will meet to plan the next day of the chapter and use the existing agenda. It makes for a more extended day – since most of us are up at 4:30 AM and getting to our bedrooms at 9:30 PM.

There are other commissions where everyone meets with a group at night, essential pieces of our chapter and religious life. They are: "Memory Discernment" (creating a narrative story of this chapter to share with the entire Congregation at the end of the chapter), secretariat of the chapter (taking the minutes and recording events), liturgy (with my role in this too), study of the founder and Eymardian place, finances, formation -initial for new members and ongoing for regular members, juridical or canonical lessons and

We listened to a 90-minute report (spoken in French without a drink of water or

(Spain), the Vicar General, on the report of the **General Council's work** over the last six years. This was followed by meeting in 5 groups: three English-speaking groups and two French-speaking groups. In our groups, we reacted to the reports with our positive realities and challenges. We are grateful for the work of the Council and what they did for us, visiting most of the provinces during the 6-year mandate. After each report, we move into our French or English language small groups. Each group then reacted to the report: 3 English-speaking and 2 French-speaking, with me in group 1 and Father Norman Pelletier in group 2.

Father Eugenio stressed that we are building praying communities and retreats and need to study the pope's pastoral letter on liturgy, Wednesday morning began with us hearing a report from the General Superior, Father Eugenio Barbosa Martins (Brazil). It was a 20-page report, sharing most of the realities our General has observed over the past six years. Father Eugenio touched on current issues, such as

- global "boiling" (for the warming is over, and we are at this critical reality),
- a post-pandemic world, the fruits of the last chapter at Mundelein (Chicago), Illinois,

Desiderio desideravi, which encourages a theological and liturgical updating of our religious. Father General shared how we are building "servant communities," working with migrants, immigrants, refugees, and concrete examples of ministry to the houseless in our world. We rejoice that we have this vigil year before the $40^{\rm th}$ anniversary of our *Rule of Life*. We will discuss these documents and the anniversary next week when we have a retreat day.

We are blessed with a new *Commentary on the Life Project (the original name of the Rule of Life for Associates of the Blessed Sacrament)*, the USA translation of this document from our Generalate. Father Manuel Barbiero sent this out a few months ago *(and I shared this with our Grapevine in a previous issue)*. The Aggregation is growing strong, and we rejoice in this gift to the Eymardian family and the church.

Internationality and growth of the Geographical Conferences (i.e., Asia-Oceania, Americas, Europe, Africa) are concepts and pushes for implementation in these past six years. We only need to look at our province to see how this has become a growing reality, and we have also had two meetings at the American Conference. Finally, Father Barbosa suggested that the next administration continue or develop since he is not eligible for reelection due to our statutes with a two-term, 12-year limit.

The Most Reverend Joseph Nguyen Nang, Archbishop of Saigon City, made a pastoral visit to address the 36th General Chapter on Wednesday, November 8. He noted how it was so important that our religious order followed the example of Pope Francis, coming to the peripheries of the world. He was so happy to welcome



the first religious order to come to this archdiocese to have their General Chapter rather than in Rome, where most do.

He encouraged us to look forward despite the challenges that *all* religious orders face with diminishment in religious vocations. He has spoken to other religious orders and faced the realities of different ways of living the religious life. The archbishop encouraged us always to stay close to the center of our vocation – the Eucharist. A true point:

We must still support the spiritual life of the young; in the past, we used to say, 'Take up the cross and follow Iesus.' Young people now ask, 'Why must I take up a cross?' It is a challenge to understand the sacrifices of life. Our role is to explain to the young the reality of the cross and share important mystery of faith.

The archbishop really

appreciates our theme and theme song for the chapter, expressing the Eucharistic mission for this is so needed and necessary for this archdiocese and the churches worldwide. Our presence in this archdiocese encourages people to live the Eucharistic mystery and is so appreciated.

Our afternoon group work devoted itself to taking time with many questions from the General's report and the following:



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- 1. What [picture] of the Congregation does the group identify [as a priority]?
- 2. What elements need to be improved [in the next General Administration]?
- 3. What are the three topics to be treated in priority in this General Chapter to realize the theme of this chapter: SSS Religious: together, faithful witnesses of the eucharistic mission?

Following these group reports, we heard the **Secretary-General and Procurator**

canonical and legal issues, and the personnel realities that have been part of a process over the last years, especially when a person leaves the SSS Congregation. Thursday morning, the feast of the holy Lateran Basilica in Rome, we began with the Filipino province leading us in Eucharist and Morning Prayer. After an excellent buffet breakfast for the liturgical feast, we entered into the study of our Geographical conferences and the specific issues that face

Holding back tears, he shared the ministries of **Brothers Michael O'Leary, Thomas Mella, and Michael Perez,** and these stories need to be told and shared to inspire the **brother vocation** and increase our vocation as brothers in service to one another and the Church.

These touchstones have guided us so far; there is much more to come, and we are enjoying our time together, recognizing the blessings and gifts we have to offer one another and the Church.
