Welcoming Father Jaime Ario Rodriguez Reyes SSS

My name is Jaime Ario Rodríguez Reyes. I was born on June 26, 1977, in El Real, Cajibio, department of Cauca, Colombia.

I am the 5th child of Efraín Rodríguez Mosquera and María Calixta Reyes Lame. I have three brothers and a sister. My family, to this day, are farmers; we work the land growing sugar cane, coffee, bananas, and corn at various times of the year. My father died by drowning in the Cauca River on September 3, 1981; I was four years old. Since then, it has been my mother who has continued to support us in everything.

I completed my basic studies in 2 stages, the first three years at the Mixed Rural School in the village of El Real. Due to financial reasons, I suspended my studies and dedicated myself to farm work. Between the ages of 16 and 19, I accompanied my brother to the preparation to be catechists in the parish.

At 19 (1997), I was recruited for mandatory military service for 18 months. At the end of this experience, with the help of maternal relatives, I went to work at a grocery store in Popayán. The family's condition was that they helped me in the first steps, with the aim of me resuming my studies until I finished them. It was a demanding stage in the work and study schedule. I left at 6:30 am for work until 6:00 pm when I returned home, and from 7:00 to 10:30 pm at school.

By the end of 2001, I was finishing my studies and attending a small chapel where the Eucharist was celebrated every Saturday. I participated as a lector

and eventually spoke with the priest, who invited me to begin a vocational discernment. I accepted the process, and every Sunday afternoon, after leaving work, I went to the Santo Domingo parish in Popayán to learn more about religious life and the charism and mission of the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament. This process ended with a mission experience. Then, I entered the formation house on July 9, 2002, in Bogotá, Colombia.

My studies in various stages: 1st and 2nd Philosophy at Santo Tomas

University (2003-2004), 3rd Philosophy at San Buenaventura University (2005), Novitiate at Sete Lagoas, Brazil (2006-2008), 1st Profession (January 13, 2008), Theology at San Alfonso University (2008-2012), Perpetual profession (April 20, 2013), Diaconate (May 11, 2013), Priestly Ordination, (December 14, 2013). I earned a BA in theology (Colombia) and (USA).

- 2. December 2014, Santísimo Sacramento Parish, Puerto Rico.

- 5. January 2020-2021, parish priest alone in the Santísimo Sacramento Parish, Puerto Rico.
- 6. May-November 2021, missionary in the diocese of Caguas Puerto Rico, Santo Cristo de la Salud Parish, Comerío.
- 7. November 2021-May 2024, missionary in the diocese of Caguas, Puerto Rico, San Antonio de Padua Parish, Barranquitas.

Father Jaime (*James in English*) served in Puerto Rico for nine years with our SSS Community there. Unfortunately, with two SSS men dying of COVID-19, this mission closed, and Father Jaime is coming to our province for four years with a 'convention of transfers" between the two provinces. He will serve as a parochial vicar at Corpus Christi Catholic Church, Houston, Texas, with a particular emphasis on the Spanishspeaking community, a void we are happy to fulfill. Additionally, Father Jaime will be learning English.

Born June 26, 1977, in a rural region 10 hours north of Bogota, Columbia, he grew up in a family of four other siblings. He joined the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament and did his formation with the collaborative efforts of both provinces of South America, learning formation and studies in Spanish and Portuguese. He was ordained on December 14, 2013, under the

patronage of one of his favorite saints, John of the Cross. Some feel he looks like Saint Martin de Pores, another of his favorite saints.

We welcome Father Jaime to the province of Saint Ann for four years; he is at the provincialate for a few weeks to complete the usual paperwork necessary to be part of our province systems. Luckily, Father holds a green card for serving in the United States in Puerto Rico for an extended period. Father Jaime began his service at Corpus Christi Parish in Houston, Texas, in August 2024.

From the Provincial's Perspective

Jubilee. Dictionary definitions tell us that a "Jubilee" denotes a special anniversary of an event, celebrating twenty-five or fifty years, etc., or a reign of activity. The Bible describes in the Hebrew Scriptures a detailed purpose of a jubilee and how the word comes from the sounding of a ram's horn, a *yobel*, with this instrument inaugurating a special time and marking its launch.

In the Province of Saint Ann, we are blessed that our notable anniversaries always correspond with the Roman Catholic Church's jubilee year. Pope Francis proclaims 2025 the Jubilee Year and the theme of being "Pilgrims of Hope." One hundred and twenty-five years ago, the Blessed Sacrament religious in Montréal, Quebec, Canada, and Rome prepared to go to Mexico City. Due to a revolution in Mexico, at the last moment, four religious groups embarked for the United States of America to a French-Canadian parish on the Upper East Side of Manhattan, New York City. We began administering Eglise Saint Jean Baptiste on December 12, 1900, and our mission has grown and evolved across the United States ever since.

We invite you to be part of this special time of jubilee for the Church and the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament. We will also have celebrations and benefit dinners at our current sites where we minister to build up the Body of Christ and prepare for the next 125 years. I look forward to going to two of our previous foundation sites, too, in Albuquerque, New Mexico, and Menasha, Wisconsin, where we still have very strong affiliations with you, our benefactors, donors, partners in ministry, Associates of the Blessed Sacrament and friends of the Eymardian Family. And, as Pope Francis, like previous popes, who every 25 years call for a Jubilee Holy Year, we join the whole Church with the chosen theme of hope. We are all pilgrims on the journey. The 2025 Jubilee Year logo encapsulates the theme quite well and where we, as the Province of Saint Ann in our continuing service, hope to be in our Eucharistic life. The logo shows four stylized figures, like those first very different SSS religious who came from Montréal; each had one purpose: to bring the winds of the Spirit and the Good News of Christ together in the Eucharist from the earth's four corners.

The logo (*shown on page 4*) shows one pilgrim holding the cross, anchored in hope, helping us all with the waves of life. Things don't always go smoothly in life, and do we ever have calm waters? Our adventure as SSS has had its challenges in the last 125 years, and so will the next 125 years! But as our men, the Associates and Sister Servants of the Blessed Sacrament, have proven by their collaborative efforts, prayers, and donations to support our mission, **WE CAN CONTINUE TO PROMOTE AND SERVE THE EUCHARISTIC CHRIST.**



We are anchored in hope still! My Life and the SSS Congregation

From a young age, I had sensed a calling to the priesthood, but I felt no desire for the diocesan priesthood and was drawn to religious life. In eighth grade, "the vocation recruiter" from the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament, visited our school. I knew nothing about the Congregation but accepted an invitation to spend a weekend at their minor seminary in Hyde Park, New York. I was not impressed with that experience, but, no doubt, a gift of the Holy Spirit, I decided to apply and was accepted.

In September 1961, my parents, six siblings, and I drove to the Hyde Park seminary. We unloaded my belongings and were warmly welcomed by seminarians and religious. My family left, and I was in unchartered waters. I had never been away from home, and here I was in a strange place. I began feeling anxious and went to the chapel where several religious were on priedieus in adoration. I remember kneeling and praying, "If you want me to do this, give me peace."

I stayed and became comfortable in this new regimented life of silence, study, prayer, and fraternity. I entered a class of over 40, but when we graduated from high school, only 10 were left. I enjoyed the life of the seminary and established some great friendships. I was impressed with many priests and brothers who showed a deep personal concern for us and challenged us to grow intellectually, spiritually, socially, and physically. I later enjoyed living in a community with many of these same religious.

After a year of college, I, with over forty young men from our college and our two minor seminaries, entered the novitiate in Barre, Massachusetts. In August, we received the religious habit and began what was to be a year of intense spiritual training and development. These post-Vatican II years were challenging for the Church, the Congregation, and the novitiate. From the beginning, we spent each day with three hours of adoration, daily Mass, the hours of the Divine Office, and praying the rosary. Most of the day was spent in silence, including work, study, and recreation. Then we began going around parishes singing folk Masses and even recorded an album of our music. While we kept most of the spiritual exercises, the tenor of the novitiate changed. We were allowed to smoke, and silence was no longer the order of the day.

After two years, we made our first profession of vows and were off to Cleveland to study at John Carroll University. This was a whole new world. We were professed religious living in a monastery connected to a large parish. We were students who participated in the life of the parish, and some of us taught religion at a Catholic high school in the middle of Cleveland. Many of us also received minor orders during those years. It was a great community with priests like Eugene LaVerdiere, Frank Costa, Roger Bourgeois, Jack Dowling, and Joseph Nearon. We learned much about priesthood and religious life from them and other members of this large community. I graduated from John Carroll in 1971. I was the only member of my 1961 freshman class of Eymard Seminary still in the Congregation. Believing at this time that I was where I belonged and where I intended to stay for the rest of my life, before moving to my next assignment, I made my final profession.

I was then transferred to Saint Jean the Baptiste Church in New York City to begin studies at Fordham University. Shortly after I arrived in New York, the Province purchased a house of study for theology students in the Bronx near Fordham. I was a member of that small community. After earning an MA in religious education, I enrolled in Woodstock

College, the Jesuit Seminary of the New York and Maryland Provinces. There, I studied Sacramental, Pastoral, and Historical Theology. There, I began a lifelong love of Church History and the History of the Church in the United States, courses I taught in graduate schools for many years. During my New York years, I again was impacted by many of the SSS religious.

With the time for ordination coming into focus, I had a period of deep prayer, reflection, and consultation. I decided to leave the Congregation and sought a dispensation from my vows. It was a sad time for me as I was leaving a group of men who greatly impacted my life. So much of who I am is due to the Congregation, but I knew it was the right decision to leave.

I returned to Cleveland, where I was offered the position of theology teacher at a Catholic school. I had many lay friends in Cleveland whom

administration. Along with my over 40 years of high school ministry, I worked to establish a Master of Arts degree in religious education at John Carroll University. Then, I collaborated on initiating a Master's degree in Catholic School Administration and a Master's degree in Ministry at Ursuline College.

I married Sue Ann in 1977 at Saint Paschal Baylon Church, where twenty-three priests were concelebrating, most of them SSS priests I had lived with at one time or another. Our three children, born in the next six years, were all baptized by Father Donald Pelotte or Father Norman Pelletier.

I had befriended during college, and I began my new life at 26. I was busy working, socializing, and volunteering in my local parish, and I knew that I needed to take a break from the Congregation to shape that new life.

I began my career in Catholic high school teaching and Father Norman Pelletier, a dear friend for many years, returned from serving in the Generalate of the Congregation for 18 years. Almost immediately elected Provincial of Saint Ann's Province brought me back into a closer association with the Congregation. Father Norman held gatherings on Memorial Day, Fourth of July, and Labor Day. Many SSS from Saint Paschal's came along with some of the priests from the Asian Provinces who were doing Mission Appeals in this country. Sue, a few other laypeople, and I also joined these events.

Sue and I went on an Eymard Pilgrimage to France with Norman

Pelletier and attended two provincial chapters and several provincial retreats as guests. Father Norman asked me to write the history of Saint Ann's Province, and I spent some time in the archives of the Generalate with Fr. Norman, who was doing research. So far, history has been done until the 1970s.

I wrote my first book review for Emmanuel Magazine while living at Saint Jean's in NYC in 1972. I love to read, so I continued writing reviews for this SSS magazine long after I left. Twenty-five years ago, Father Anthony Schueller, then Emmanuel's editor, asked me to become the book review editor. I did that until the magazine ceased publication in 2020. I wanted to continue volunteering and be part of a Life in the Eucharist (LITE) Team, a ministry of the Center for Eucharistic Evangelizing, and I accepted. I am part of the CEE's Daily Eucharistic Reflection team, writing two reflections monthly, and have served on two LITE retreat teams.

In 2017, I was honored to be invited to rejoin the Eymardian Family as an Associate. The experience of so many of the exemplary men of the Province with whom I lived and worked profoundly impacted me, and in the last few years, I have tried to give back something I received.

I left the Congregation after 13 years to follow a different road: marriage, parenthood, and grandparenthood – that has been an incredible blessing, but in many ways, our success as a family is grounded in the values, ideals, and virtues of that former way of life. "We feel like an integral part of the Eymardian Family. All have made us feel like we really belong." These words of Mary and Ray Frato indicate the power of their long association with the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament at our Cleveland, Ohio SSS Community, where they have worked side by side with our religious and associates.

Lebanese from a family of six. Her mom and dad immigrated from Lebanon several years back, but unfortunately, Mary has yet to return to her native land and meet her many cousins who are still living there. Ray is a native Clevelander; his paternal and maternal grandparents immigrated from Italy. Mary and Ray met through a multi-parish young adults' group in 1986, then married in 1991 and started their family. They live in Lyndhurst, Ohio (*near Saint Paschal Baylon Parish*) and have two children: a daughter, Angela, and a son, Ray Junior. They have two grandchildren. Mary spends time with the grandchildren. In his earlier days, Ray's dad did much plumbing work for the Benedictines in Cleveland. Ray relates that his dad "got a kick out of the fact that Ray was working for the SSS at their provincial headquarters."

They love working with the individual religious and feel that the SSS are part of their extended family, and they feel like they are very much part of the larger Eymaridan Family.

Mary and Ray had a café/gift shop in downtown Cleveland for 22 years. When Ray's health deteriorated, they could not continue with this small business venture, so Ray started working for the SSS, maintaining their vehicles (2010), and since then, his responsibilities have expanded significantly. You can often hear the SSS community question: "Do you know where Ray is? I need him to do something." Ray monitors many mechanical things in the community and has remodeled and upgraded many building areas. Ray is responsible for anything that breaks, and

he can fix it. The community relies on him for almost everything. He does plumbing repairs, room remodeling, electrical work, and computer assistance and secures bids for the yearly SOAR (Support Our Aging Religious) and other grants. Mary has been concentrating on cleaning and readying rooms for our guests.

Ray started attending Saint Paschal's in 1986, and Mary was involved at Gesú Parish in University Heights. They both joined Saint Paschal Baylon in 2004.

They are both generously involved in the Helping Hands/Clown Ministry, of which they are cotreasurers. They continue to be active members of Saint Paschal Baylon Parish. Their family keeps them entirely occupied.


Celebrating Saint Ann in Ohio and New York


